### **LINCOLN STREET PASTORS**

Wow, what an amazing God we serve, how he loves to bless us, beyond our wildest expectations.....

**Firstly, He gives** us the exact shortfall in our budget of 19K from the local council and agencies, then when we believed Him for 16 'Street Pastors' he gave us 27, who started training on Saturday 1st September, and what a day of blessing that was.

**Without your faithful prayers** this project would not be moving forward....Praise God for each one of you. But now we have another need, and we are trusting God to do yet another miracle.

**From October 5th** the trained 'Lincoln Street Pastors' are moving out in ministry every Friday or Saturday night to the lonely, the unloved, the homeless and those just enjoying an evening out with friends, seeking to show them by example the love of Jesus.

**However,** without prayer cover while the team are operating, this whole project will end in failure, no country would send it's soldiers into battle without support, and we cannot do battle for Jesus without prayer.

**Again we need your prayers** like never before. We need folk who will commit to pray in one or more different ways, and we seek your support, once again:

- 1.** Remember 'Lincoln Street Pastors' in your regular prayer time, or set aside 15 minutes each week to pray for our city at a set time.
- 2.** Commit to praying in your own home once a month while the team are on the streets, maybe alone or with others, but please let us know.
- 3.** Commit to praying once a month at a central point with others while the team are working. Thank you to those who have already come forward to be involved with this prayer cover, but we need more, so the burden can be shared more widely. Perhaps, you did not feel able to train as a 'Pastor' for various reasons, but want to be involved, please prayerfully consider this vital support, and make it known as widely as possible amongst your church and friends.

## **Methodist Conference 2007, Blackpool, by Pete Pillinger**

Grateful for our prayers Pete now shares some of his thoughts and news of this years Conference.

**With the ultimate objective of 'discerning the will of God'** I sometimes wonder why more time is not given to prayer. For a long time I have had a vision of people - ordinary Methodists - arriving by the coach load to pray for what is going on in the Conference hall. We may not all have the gifts to speak in debate or the time to attend all of Conference but all of us have a direct line to God. What a signal it would be if we needed more space for the pray-ers than for the Conference debates!! But enough of dreaming, what about the Conference?

**It was the most inspiring Conference of any of the 8 I have attended** over the last 26 years. The Worship was good and we were not riven by debates such as those on sexuality.

As always we have elected a President and Vice President designate and Martyn Atkins and Ruby Beech were duly installed. If you have broadband internet access you can listen to their addresses on the Methodist Conference radio website - along with all the other debates.

The President's Speech is half way down the list. Martyn Atkins' address was inspiring and during Conference his choice of material, hymns and songs and the leading of music by the worship group, Wellspring, was superb. We were truly led into God's presence. Martyn called us to be a mission movement for the 21st century. Ruby Beech was also clear and called us to consider the Biblical roots of standing up for the oppressed. She spoke of the anniversary of the abolition of the slave trade and went on to identify oppression of women and homosexuals. I hope you will pray for both Ruby and Martyn during their year in office. President designate for 2008/9 is Revd Stephen Poxon, chair of the North Lancashire district and Secretary of the Missionary Society (yes it does still exist). Vice President designate is Mr David S Walton. I am struck by the quality of the people God has given us these last few years. Over the last five we have had a consistent thread to the messages of our Presidents. From Neil Richardson's call to refocus on God through Will Morrey's call to us to listen to God, Tom Stuckey's call for radical fresh ways of being church, Graham Carter's call to serious discipleship and now to Martyn's continuation of God's guidance - for all this I am grateful to God.

### **Issues and Debates:**

**Bishops** The recommendation to Conference from Faith and Order Committee regarding 'What sort of Bishops' was that we should not proceed further on this matter at present. The feedback from the consultation process showed an overwhelming lack of interest on the matter. An impression was given that 'if people had understood what we were saying they would have voted differently'. To which one speaker asked 'What part of 'NO' do you not understand!'. The report of the Joint Implementation Commission (JIC) on the Covenant raised the issue of Bishops as one to be dealt with and they have a final report back next year - so Bishops will not go away, but at least they are firmly asleep at present. I'm encouraged that there seems to be less enthusiasm among younger ministers than among older ones. This goes, I think, with a greater confidence in God's future for us.

**Restructuring the Connexional Team** Conference approved the proposals for restructuring the Connexional Team and those of you who read the Methodist Recorder will have seen advertisements for the next General Secretary and for the Connexional Secretaries. Conference reaffirmed that it is the President who is the Leader of the church (not the General Secretary) but we have still agreed to look for a new General Secretary who will be in post from September 2008. Please pray for those involved in the appointments process and for God to prompt the right person to apply. Conference did agree that at least one of the Connexional Secretaries would have knowledge and experience of evangelism. We might hope (and pray) that all the secretaries of our church would be enthusiastic for evangelism.

**World Church** There was some debate about the future of the World Church Office. There is still significant pressure for the ending of the Funds for World and Home mission and to have a single Methodist Church Fund. Conference has consistently refused to agree to this. In this reorganisation, as in previous ones, the British Conference has largely ignored the fact that the Methodist Missionary Society is a joint body representing both the British and Irish Conferences. We have made proposals for reorganising based on perceived needs of the British Church - and in the process have made monies from World Church sources available for some limited uses in Britain. It was probably the saddest moment of Conference 2007 when Winston Graham, a real 'gentle man' and a representative of the Irish Conference, rose to tell the British Conference that the Irish Conference is having to consider going it alone in its future World Church work. There have been conversations since, but the failure of the British Methodist Church to understand

its relationships with the Irish Methodist Church is a sad one indeed. We must pray that one of the secretaries to be appointed this autumn has significant World Church experience.

**Restructuring Conference** Once again Conference has agreed to reduce its size. 28% of Conference is ex officio of one sort or another; Chairs of District (34), Conference Officers, Conference Elected representatives etc. This year Conference agreed to reduce the number elected by Conference itself from 18 to 9, each serving for three years. Conference also agreed that it should be 50% ordained and 50% lay. Because most of the ex officio' people are ordained this means that ministers from the districts will find it harder to get to Conference. I leave you to decide if this is a good thing or not! Making sure half of Conference is lay highlights the difficulties of a Conference meeting in school term time. All teachers are excluded from going to Conference as are many others who cannot afford to take a week off work. It makes me ask if in the 20th century there is a better way of discerning God's will? Perhaps we could hold debates on the web? Could we make referenda a normal part of our church life? What other ways could we improve the ways we listen to God?

**Ordinations** As is our practice those who have tested a call to ministry (Presbyters and Deacons), who have completed their training and proven their ministry in a probationary period, were presented to Conference to be accepted into 'full connexion' on the Sunday and were ordained. The Reception into full connexion is always for me an inspiring and moving occasion. It must encourage us that God is still calling men and women of all ages and from all sorts of backgrounds into the ministry of His church. I am encouraged that so many are enthusiasts for God.

**Charity Law** While not under the control of Conference a report was given on the changes in charity law and its implications for Methodist Churches. Under the Charities Act 2006 the category of 'excepted charities' under which we have worked until now is ending. In the Methodist year 2007/8 churches and circuits with an income of over £100,000 will have to register as charities in their own right - about 280 circuits and 360 local churches. There are transitional arrangements for churches with income of less than this but eventually every church will be registered as a separate charity and make its own returns to the charity commission. Each will have to show that there is some public benefit to gain charitable status. This decision of the British Parliament recognises the trust status of every Methodist Church, something which was blurred under the last Methodist Church Act. I think we should be pleased about this in spite of the additional work which will be required at local level. The new Charity law recognises that when a local trust is set up, that trust is primary. The implication would seem to be that the Custodian Trustees in Manchester are custodians of each local trust, not some mega trust for the denomination.

**A new Hymn Book** Conference agreed to produce both a 'rolling resource' probably based on the Internet and a new printed hymn book. The fact that the Methodist Publishing House has been making a loss (£0.8 million last year) may be entirely unconnected. If each copy costs £8 and we have a church of 250,000 members, and if churches buy new hymn books for half our membership it will cost our churches over a million pounds to equip themselves with this new book. Is this really the best use of our resources? Could a million pounds not be better spent on employing evangelists either in Britain or around the world?

**Fresh Expressions of Church** Conference received a short report on the development of Fresh Expressions of Church. I'm biased, having written this (and the book which goes with it), but it was encouraging that the Fresh Expressions fringe meeting was one of the largest and that when the Conference split into four 'forums' a third of Conference decided to go to the Fresh expressions one. There is a genuine enthusiasm for mission-shaped expressions of church among the Methodist people. The book 'Changing Church for a Changing World' is suitable for personal reading or group study. [Peter may still have some copies, or be able to tell you where to get it from]it is also available from local Christian bookshops or from the Publishing House for £4.95 or for £3.50 for ten or more copies. According to Howard Mellor it is one of the best things to come from Fresh Expressions, and Graham Horsley, Connexional Church Planting and Evangelism Strategy Secretary said 'Its very good.'

**Stationing Committee** We look likely to have around 45 less new or transferring ministers than are retiring or moving out each year for the next five or six years at least. The total reduction over the period is from 1876 ministers this year to 1675 in 2011/12. The Stationing committee report states that 'the Connexion will continue to struggle to station presbyters and deacons in 'conventional' appointments whilst at the same time attempting to provide ministers for new, imaginative and innovative work in 'Fresh expressions' opportunities and other developments.' We continue to be short of ministers but have to make room for new work. Pray that the Lord of the Harvest sends us labourers.
